

Dearhearts,

It is in the valley that the chariot of God swings low. Swings low to meet us where we are. To carry us through the bog...or to lift us out. But sometimes our fear blinds us. Sometimes our grief so blurs our vision we do not seeas with Elisha's servant- the chariots of holy fire rimming our mountains ready to battle for us.

My hardest times, when God seemed harshly unmindful of my desperate straits...when he was rock hard and I knew I didn't like Him anymore, are those I look back on now and see that it was there that my life changed. My walk with Him, strangely, grew from that humus. Grew stronger. Grew deeper. But in the valley I could not see Him. I did not know who this strange, remote Being was who had fallen from a throne of intimate caring to one of detached indifference. It is in these places that we most fear what we have signed up for.

And then...a chariot of fire on the mountain. An army of one...snatching me up...or out at the last possible terrifying moment! It is in these bi-polar swings that we are drawn out to our last gasping breath of faith and then suddenly comes a mighty, gushing torrent.

It is the story of Mary Magdalene weeping at the garden tomb...and then seized with joy. It is the story of Peter weeping in a desolate night and then restored to destiny. Abruptly. In the twinkling of an eye. It is Mary and Martha in the most hopeless of realities and suddenly the impossible happens and tears of excruciating grief turn to tears of gratitude and joy cried over His feet and then wiped dry with her hair.

Where are those places in your life? Places of confusion at best...or anger with God...or a deep, aching despair? Or maybe you're just giving back in kind. He seemed indifferent...so there you are, God...I don't care either! And so our heart goes away. The stuff of relationship freezes. And Christ gets entombed in our pain

We must find where God was in the mess if ever we are to have a faith that sustains us in the valley...a God whose chariot we know will swing low. Know, not by what we see...but by who we know. By faith.

Perhaps 35 years ago as I spoke at my first women's event – a 3 day conference at a large church in Dallas - a young woman whom I had known for several years got up and left. I didn't really think anything of it. She was probably not feeling well. But it was fifteen years before I heard from her when the phone rang that day. "Do you remember that time you spoke at the church and I got up and left in the middle of it?" she asked as I said yes. "I walked out because you were talking about the potholes in our faith and the need to go back to the hard places in our lives and find where God was in the mess. I was angry because what happened to me when I was 17 was so horrific God could not possibly have been there! Well, I need to ask your forgiveness because two years ago, in a moment, God showed me where He was!" her voice was animated. "I now know He did not abandon me, that He cared about me and what happened. After years of going through the motions with God, I am now a leader in Bible Study Fellowship."

If we do not see His chariot in our valleys, the fear that gripped us there - the confusion and questions -will haunt our soul and hold our faith hostage. It is in the valleys that our view of God is framed. If our heart takes refuge in the catacombs of fear or grief, we will never see Christ standing there with us. We will see only the apparition that formed there of Him. And we will not trust the voice calling to us. Christ called Peter from his bitter night, and He called Mary away from the tomb.

"Why do you seek the living among the dead?" If we always return to the graveyard of our pain...if the Living became entombed there...then we will never see His chariot swinging low to lift us from the valley floor, and our eyes will never be opened to see chariots of God - aflame with glory - that have been fighting for us all along.

The Crisis Fund

In November's newsletter we mentioned the long-depleted status of our crisis fund and the woman who had begun sacrificially giving "seed money" to it in the trust that



God would grow it into a harvest. On the heels of that article, almost \$1,500.00 came in that month to the crisis fund and by the end of December, you had given just over \$3,000.00. And by the end of December, too, the tornado had hit in Rowlett. From this fund, we have been able to minister to those and other needs:

- Providing groceries and utilities for multiple Rowlett tornado victims
- \$300.00 to a disabled mother of four
- \$500.00 toward dentures for a woman with long-term tooth decay and loss
- Paying someone in need of extra income to clean the ministry facility monthly and compensating another on limited income for hours of service given to the ministry

## Crises Behind the Fund

**Single Mother of 4.** She had managed to provide for her children on her own for many years...until the seizures started. Sometimes dozens a day that, after two years, left doctors scratching their heads and Melody unable to talk. After a year, her speech slowly started returning but remains a great challenge. Still, she has been turned down 7 times for SS disability leaving Medicaid as her only source of income. When she went to her Bible to get the \$300 she had tucked away there for her utilities, it was gone. Though she did not ask for help, when we heard of her need, we were able to help with her utilities.

**Dentures.** She held a high paying managerial position until mental illness struck years ago. Over time, family help has shrunk down to the most basic needs but dental care was not one of them. Her few remaining lower teeth appear ready to collapse from decay. Her 26 year old son has brought her to live with him but he has to choose between her dental needs and having a toilet and bathroom facilities that work. *Because of your gifts* we were able to supplement what he had saved and when we see her the middle of this month she will, for the first time in over a decade, have a full set of beautiful teeth.

Pilgrims of the Night The Ancients Who Have Touched our World

Tuesday Nights in April 7:00 p.m.

focuses on those men and women of our faith, both Catholic and Protestant who markedly impacted how people saw God and how they dared to dream and live. Men and women, both flawed and noble, who dared to believe they could experience God's presence. Who followed and carried a sacred Torch.

With an introductory look at the cauldron of turmoil that enveloped the church from the 5<sup>th</sup> century on, we consider the lives of those who were part of the remnant of the faithful who threaded their way through a spiritual night. ## Francis of Assisi and Catherine of Sienna are

other figures of this era surrounded by legend, some true and some exaggerated. But for both, the blade that cuts through the myth to the



truth points to two lives sold out to the quest for God and His ways regardless of the sacrifice.

**Teresa of Avila** and **John of the Cross** as contemporaries living in the <u>1500's were part of</u>

the remnant thread of faithful that ran through the Catholic Church at

the time of push-back against the priests of the reformation (Luther, Huss, etc.). Though teaching a personal experiencing of Christ, they were revered and eventually canonized by the church.





**Francis de Sales** was another priest of the late 16<sup>th</sup> century who understood a relationship of the Spirit and was known for his humility and grace, always opting for reconciliation and love in the midst of the persecution and condemnation of his day. Half a century later, four figures associated with Quietism emerged in the Catholic church with teachings

akin to those of Teresa and St. John. But rather than beatification, the church imprisoned **Jeanne Guyon**, **Miguel Molinos and Father Francois Lacombe**, who

never emerged from his imprisonment. **Father Fenelon**, though never imprisoned, faced severe resistance and demotion within the church. These figures, especially Guyon, directly changed the spiritual world of Europe, America and China through to the dawn of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. Their teachings and their lives are a



legacy worthy of remembering. They illumine our way and speak to us of enduring faith and love.
